HIGH PROFILE:

BILL SMITH – FREE SPIRIT MAN

Bill Smith is another long-time AOPC member. In fact, he was right there at the beginning of the formation of the Arkansas Outdoor Photographers Club, and with others was instrumental in getting it off the ground. Bill remembers meeting and talking with Matt Bradley, a local professional photographer who also became an AOPC member, way back in 1996 or 1997, about how there wasn't an outdoor photography club in Arkansas but that there should be. And for decades now, there has been. Thank you, Bill, for all your help and involvement.

Bill's preoccupation with outdoor photography stems from his love of the outdoors, but unlike many photographers, his interest did not begin in childhood. He first became interested in photography in 1976 when, as an adult, he was on a trip to Idaho where he had an elk hunting permit. His first camera, the one he used on that trip, was "not a good one," a Petri 35 mm camera with a 50 mm lens, but he nevertheless became enthused with the slides and photos he took. Bitten hard by the bug, he upgraded after he returned from his trip and bought a Canon AE-1. He later bought one of the first autofocus Canon cameras, an EOS 620. He has stayed with the Canon brand ever since, having also had a Canon 5D, 5D-III, 7D, and 7D-II. His current favorite lenses are a Canon 600mm f4 and a Canon 100-500 mm. Photography is his main hobby, and if circumstances had been different, he would have liked to have been a professional photographer.

While Bill got into photography because of his interest in outdoor photography, he has done some portrait photography and some sports photography. In the Perryville area where Bill and his wife lived, he took sports photos at local junior and senior high school football and basketball games and sold them through a website. He connected with other sports photographers, including Ted McClenning, who joined the club at Bill's invitation.

Bill's photographic journey led him to a fascination with videography. He bought one of Canon's first 3-chip (RGB) cameras but more recently has acquired a Canon R-5, which Bill finds to be the ideal camera for him. Bill says that camera can do it all, certainly all Bill wants it to do – stills, slow-motion and great videography. Bill intends to combine all those products and start a YouTube channel as well as put items on his Facebook page. He has a name for it already: Dakota's Travels with Free Spirit Man. He may be looking to acquire an R-6 camera body so he can have cameras already fitted, each with one of his two favorite lenses. Because of the weight, Bill uses a tripod, a Gitzo with a Wimberley head. He sometimes will also use a bean bag resting on his lowered car window to shoot from the car.

Another feature Bill likes about the R-5 is its "animal eye" focus choice, something that appears to appeal to many photographers. He says it is wonderful for getting excellent bird shots. Bill's favorite subjects are outdoor photography, including wildlife and birds, especially birds in flight (he likes the challenge).

Bill is retired, well, mostly anyway, from his work as an independent computer programmer and his wife passed away a while ago. Now Bill is ready to become a nomad with his travel buddy, Dakota, a German

shepherd who had been dumped a couple years ago when Bill found her. He has had her spayed, microchipped and fitted with a GPS tracking unit, although Bill says she rarely gets 20 feet away from him.



The duo have become well-equipped with a Jeep Cherokee and a fully self-contained housing unit fashioned from a 6 X 12-foot cargo trailer. Bill and Dakota will soon be hitting the road with the intent to travel around the west and to live at least part of the year in New Mexico. The set-up is just the right size for them, providing a bed, air conditioning, a microwave, toaster-oven, TV, fresh water and gray water tanks, and two generators. The trailer is light enough to pull on forest roads and other off-the-beaten path places out west.

While Bill's favorite place to photograph is Yellowstone, Bosque del Apache (those sandhill cranes!) and the desert southwest are also favorite haunts. His favorite place to photograph in Arkansas is the Ouachita Mountains since he knows them so well. The place he would most want to go for taking photographs where he has not yet been, is Alaska. A user of Lightroom, Bill would like to know more about Photoshop, mainly so he could enhance his images to be their very best.

Bill enjoys black and white photography and counts Ansel Adams as an influence but he has a variety of living photographers whose work informs his own. One is Steve Mathias, who takes good wildlife photos and has great owls as a specialty. Bill has become a big fan of YouTube and the photographers and other nomads whose work and ideas are found there.

Bill has a philosophy about photography: when you capture a special moment in time, it can last a lifetime in your mind. We will be looking on YouTube for Dakota and Free Spirit Man, who will be capturing those special moments in the great outdoors.

RECAP OF AOPC ZOOM MEETINGS IN 2021

NICK DAWSON'S JANUARY ZOOM PROGAM: BICYCLING THE MAAH DAAH HEY TRAIL IN NORTH DAKOTA

At the club's meeting In January, 2021, Nick Dawson started out the AOPC year with his Zoom presentation on photos he took while on a cycling trip in North Dakota on the Maah Daah Hey Trail, called North Dakota's best kept secret. Nick, the treasurer of AOPC for the last few years, has also served the club as president, vice president, and projectionist. Nick updated a program he had given in person to the club several years ago, but this time discussed not only the photo gear he took with him on his bicycling trip, but also what gear he would take if he were on the same trip in 2021.



Nick's trip was with Western Spirit, a company that specializes in leading and supporting bike excursions in the western U.S., including some in pretty remote locations. Nick has undertaken several trips with that company, which was started by a woman from Arkansas. Since the Maah Daah Hey Trail is remote and less visited than most parts of the lower 48, Nick's photos of the area and his commentary are quite informative, especially to many of us who have never been there and who are not that likely to ever visit, on a bike or otherwise. Ads for the trail say it is for the adventurous outdoors enthusiast, providing a taste of pure, unadulterated badlands.

Jason Crader, one of our great AOPC past presidents, gave the club's April, 2021 meeting presentation, by Zoom, on the topic of "A Photographer's Perspective: 25 Years of Photography Explained in 25 Photographs." Jason is a teacher, a photographer, a long-time member of our club, and someone who has a good bit of wisdom and philosophy about photography to share. He selected one photo from each year of the approximately 25 years he has been into photography. Jason has delved deep into wildlife, wedding, and street photography, and he provided tips and ideas to go with each photograph, some of which are his favorites and some are definitely not, but are good illustrations of certain concepts.



Jason said he has grown up in the club, since he was just a kid when he became involved with the club and its members. He was one of the original members of AOPC and he remembers meeting Ron Russ at the Gerlach seminar when there was first mention of forming a club. Jason noted that photography efforts mature along with the person, so this was a good look back through the years and what has been learned. And yes, there is a cow photo in the mix.



For those who don't know, Jason as a young photographer started out photographing cows at his parents' farm and he would delight attendees at many of the AOPC meetings with one or more of his cow photos during our open projector sessions. You might call him the Cow Whisperer.

It was an engaging presentation and it was followed by some good discussion about the club and how it has brought new ideas, improvement, inspiration, and joy to those involved.
